PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear MHA/FYOS alumni and friends:



By the time you read this, we will be entrenched in a new and exciting school year. Here, I'd like to reflect on all we've experienced in the past few months at the MHA/FYOS.

The 2022-23 school year was a

time of transition as Rabbi Yisroel Weiner's inaugural year as our head of school. It was also a year of tremendous learning and growth. Our talented students showcased their knowledge in nights of learning; lights of Torah programs; siddur, chumash and holiday plays, the science expo, world's fair and more. We enjoyed the CYHSB steak dinner and the GMSG gala dinner, and our students broadened their horizons with amazing trips and extracurricular activities. While we tend to highlight the activities and events outside the classroom, these only complement the daily in-class learning, enabling each student to reach their potential and achieve new heights in Torah and general studies. The steady dedication of our teachers, staff and administration knows no bounds.

The events of this summer were truly unprecedented. Memphis experienced a freak July storm, which caused damage to our campus and a prolonged power outage, displacing our Camp Shemesh summer program and requiring quick action to prevent further damage. Our incredible executive director, Brandy Flack, was on-site mere minutes after the storm to assess the damage and coordinate with contractors to ensure our school would be patched up as soon as possible. Thankfully, no one was hurt, and our friends at Baron Hirsch saved the day when they <u>opened their</u> doors without hesitation to house our camp for the rest of that week. We are so incredibly grateful! When Camp Shemesh had to close earlier than planned, Young Israel of Memphis stepped up to make sure that campers had options on their site for the remaining days. It is times like these when we can fully appreciate the beautiful giving and cohesive nature of our community.

Just when we thought we were back on track after the storm, our school made national headlines. While we hear about gun violence on a daily basis and practice active shooter drills, it is surreal when we ourselves are faced with real and present danger of this kind. Once again, our executive director, Brandy Flack, sprang into action. Though facing the danger on campus herself, she ensured that all authorities were immediately notified and safety protocols were activated. Thanks to recent security grants, our main school building has updated doors, locks and cameras, and we are so grateful that our security features stood up to the test.

In the local, national and international news forums, there has been nothing but praise for our school's secure campus and response in the face of this event. We owe a tremendous debt of gratitude to all of the school and community leaders who have worked over the years to hone our security protocols and ensure that our campus has the most up-to-date security features, as well as to our Jewish community security partners and the Memphis Police Department. We are the only Jewish organization in Memphis that has received three consecutive Homeland Security grants, and we can again thank Brandy Flack for her diligence and persistence in seeking all avenues of funding and prioritizing our school's safety.

While we feel reassured by our school's security protocols, we must pause and recognize the traumatic event we faced. We are thankful to Hashem that no students were in the building at the time and that no one at the school was harmed. TV personality Mr. Rogers once said: "When I was a boy and I would see scary things in the news, my mother would say to me, 'Look for the helpers. You will always find people who are helping." We never want to see ourselves in the news for this reason, but this event brought out the helpers from our community and well beyond. We have received messages and offers of support from far and wide, and it is very heartwarming. But for us here in Memphis, this is natural, for we are inherently a community of helpers.

In the Yekum Purkan prayer, we say:

וְכָל מִי שֶׁעוּסְקִים בְּצָרְכֵי צִבּוּר בָּאֱמוּנָה. הַקְּדוּשׁ בָּרוּךְ הוּא יִשַׁלֵם שכָרָם וְיָסִיר מֵהֶם כָּל מַחֲזָה וְיִרְפָּא לְכָל גּוּפָם וְיִסְלַח לְכָל עֲוּנָם. וְיִשְׁלַח בְּרָכָה וְהַצְלָחָה בְּכָל מַעֲשה יְדֵיהֶם עִם כָּל יִשרָאֵל אָחֵיהֶם

"All those who faithfully engage with the needs of the community — may Hashem give them their reward and remove from them all illness. May Hashem heal their bodies and forgive their sins. May Hashem send blessings and success to all that they do, together with all of Israel their brethren."

In this *tefillah*, we pray for the healing of those who work on behalf of our communities and for their transgressions to be forgiven; those who do this work are only human, and none of us are perfect. We all give of ourselves and try to use our resources and our best judgment for the betterment of our communities. The prayer ends with a request of Hashem to help us succeed in our efforts together with our *acheinu Yisrael*, our Jewish brothers and sisters, for we are all one family.

This reminds us of the moment in *Parshat Vayishlach* when Yaakov receives the name Yisrael. Yaakov had split his family into two camps and sent them ahead as he feared Eisav who was approaching. It says:

וּיָּוֶתֵר יַעֲקָב לְבַדּוֹ וַיֵּאָבֵק אִישׁ עִמּׁו עָד עֲלָוֹת הַשֶּׁחַר

"Yaakov was left alone and encountered a man who fought with him until morning" (*Bereshit* 32:25).

When dawn was breaking, the man blessed him as follows:

ַוּיּאמֶר לָא יַעֲקֹב` יֵאָמֵר עוֹד` שִׁמְךָּ כָּי אִם־יִשְׂרָאֵל כִּי־שֶׂרְיתָ עִם־ אֱלֹהֵים וְעִם־אֲנָשָׁים וַתּוּכֵּל

"You will no longer be called Yaakov, but rather Yisrael, for you have struggled with the divine and with mortals and have prevailed" (*Bereshit* 32:29).

We, too, have struggled and prevailed, and we have learned that we are never alone. We have faith in Hashem and all of *Bnei Yisrael* as one family, and we are so much stronger for it. As we look to the year ahead, we strive to grow from the challenges of this past year, build on our successes, and reach new heights for our school and community. We thank all of you who have answered the call to help this past year and hope that even more alumni will step up this coming year, as every one of you truly makes a difference. Among our school's greatest strengths is the unique dedication of our lay leaders and volunteers, who inspire us all and assure the continued success of the Margolin Hebrew Academy/Feinstone Yeshiva of the South as the foundation of the Memphis Jewish community.

We have many plans for this year, including new committees and fundraising ideas. We have formed a head of school support and evaluation committee and a board accreditation advisory committee to bolster and support our administrative team. Our operational campaign is already underway, and we are planning other fundraisers with fresh perspectives. As we talk about appreciation for community helpers, this year we are planning to dedicate a *sefer Torah* in memory of Rav Nota Greenblatt, *z'l*, a founder and pillar of our school and community. This is just a small window into the many ways each and every one of you can get involved and make an impact on our school this year.




Below are the answers to the trivia questions from issue 26. How many did you know?

Get on the Camel

When our forefather Avraham died almost 75 years after the events covered in the Torah portion read on Rosh Hashanah, he was accompanied to burial by his two sons. They were half-brothers: Yishmael, whose mother was Hagar, and Yitzchak, whose mother was Sarah.

As a young boy, Yishmael exhibited unacceptable traits of cruelty and violence. Sarah, fearing for her son's well-being, instructed Avraham to banish Yishmael and Hagar from their home. Reluctantly, Avraham sent Hagar and Yishmael away, never to see or hear from them again. So how is it that, when Avraham died almost 75 years later, Yishmael was again beside his half-brother Yitzchak, paying honor to their father Avraham?

We don't know. The Torah is silent on this subject. After Avraham sent Yishmael away, his name is not mentioned in the Torah until Avraham's funeral.

While I'm not certain, I do know this story, as told by the rabbis in the Midrash. It may be the answer, as suggested by Rabbi JJ Schacter. It definitely provides crucial insight that is directly related to every one of our lives.

Our rabbis tell us that Avraham never reconciled to sending away his son — notwithstanding Sarah's order to do so and notwithstanding Avraham's own knowledge that Yishmael was a dangerous presence in his household. But the boy was still his son, whom he loved and missed. After three years had passed, Avraham could not bear the boy's absence any longer. He traveled across the desert to see Yishmael. Sarah strenuously objected, so Avraham offered her a compromise. He swore to her that when he reached Yishmael, he would not dismount his camel, and he would then return.

When Avraham arrived, he met Issa, Yishmael's wife, whom he had never seen and who clearly had no idea who this elderly man was.

He called out to her from atop his camel, "Where is Yishmael?" She replied, "He is with his mother, collecting dates from the desert." He said, "I am exhausted from traveling. May I have a bit of bread and water?" And she said, "I don't have any bread or water to give you."

Avraham then said, "When Yishmael returns, please tell him of our conversation. Tell him, 'An old man came from Canaan to see you and tell you to change the threshold of your home.'" This was meant to be a message that only Yishmael would understand — Avraham had come to visit, and Yishmael's wife did not act with the hospitality and kindness Yishmael learned from his parents.

When Yishmael returned, Issa gave him the entire message. Soon after, Yishmael divorced her, and he later married another woman named Patumah.

Three more years passed, and again Avraham yearned for his absent son and wanted to visit. Again, Sarah objected, and again, Avraham made Sarah the same promise that he would not dismount his camel.

When Avraham arrived, he met Patumah, Yishmael's new wife, whom he had never seen and who clearly had no idea who this elderly man was.

He called out to her from atop his camel, "Where is Yishmael?" She replied, "He is with his mother, guiding the camels through the desert." He said, "I am exhausted from traveling. May I have a bit of bread and water?" Patumah then brought out food and water for Avraham to enjoy.

At that moment, Avraham turned to G-d and prayed on behalf of his distant son that his house should be filled with all manner of good and blessing.

When Yishmael returned, Patumah told him everything that had happened. Yishmael realized that all this time, his father had been thinking of him and loving him and wishing him every blessing. When Avraham died, Yishmael went home and mourned the father who had never stopped loving him, never stopped thinking of him, and never stopped caring about him.

This is one of the powerful themes of this holy season. We go through our lives, and oftentimes we feel that our parent, G-d, is distant from us, has forsaken us, is absent from our lives and doesn't care about the pain we suffer. But it is not true. Even if we don't see G-d, this narrative reminds us, now, to be aware that G-d never forgets us, G-d never forsakes us. *K'rachem av al banim* — as a father and a mother always have compassion and tenderness for their children, so does G-d feel for us.

There is an even more crucial and practical lesson each of us should learn from this story. Today we suffer from a growing epidemic of painful, deep rifts within our families — between parents and children, brothers and sisters. In how many of our families has someone been sent away or chosen to leave and never return? In how many families is one member not speaking to another? For many people, this can be one of the most difficult aspects of life that we face. Confronting this immense pain, our story contains a solution.

Notice that Avraham, when missing his son, does not say, "Why doesn't Yishmael contact me? After all, I'm the father." Or, "Yishmael was sent away for good reason." Alternatively, why doesn't Avraham send for his son to come back home to reconcile?

This is what Avraham teaches us: He initiated. Avraham took responsibility for reconciling. Avraham got on the camel. And he got on the camel again, even though there was no response the first time. He also teaches us that not receiving a response did not absolve him of the responsibility to keep trying, and trying and trying.

And it wasn't easy. Sarah argued with him. He did not succeed in even seeing his son. The first journey was depressingly unsettling, seeing the poor choices Yishmael had made. But Avraham got on the camel. He took the initiative and made the first move even though he was older, even though he was the parent, even though he didn't cause the rift. Even if someone else should have, Avraham got on the camel.

He shouldn't have had to. It's not right, it's not fair and it's not just. But Avraham teaches us that it was the only way. He had to get on the camel; there was no other way.

D'VAR TORAH Rabbi Michael Whitman (MHA '72)

I see firsthand how widespread this crisis is among us. So, I want to make a suggestion: *You* get on the camel. In this time of introspection and repentance, *you* make the first move. *You* get in your car, or on your computer, or on your phone and reach out to your father, mother, son, daughter, sister, brother or friend and tell them what they mean to you. Tell them you have never stopped loving them and thinking about them and caring about them, regardless of what has happened. And then, if necessary, do it again. And again, and again — even if there is no response.

There is no other way; you have to do it. Please, don't wait until the funeral.



Morah Eva Loskove



Nurturing two decades of MHA kindergarteners

During his tenure as dean of the MHA, Rabbi Joseph Nayowitz, *z'l*, hired a new kindergarten teacher he'd never even met. Some may have questioned that decision at the time, but it turned out to be a very wise choice. Throughout her 22 years at the MHA (1969-1991), Mrs. Eva Loskove demonstrated a great deal of caring, devotion, teaching prowess and love for Judaism. Over the course of more than two decades, she established herself as one of the school's most beloved faculty members and a teacher her young students would never forget.

Mrs. Loskove's journey to the MHA began far to the north of Memphis. Born and raised in Canada, she earned her degree in education from the University of Manitoba in Winnipeg. While staying with friends in Chicago, she met native Memphian Marvin Loskove, who was in town visiting his sister. They married shortly thereafter and ultimately settled in his hometown.

"Memphis was a wonderful place to live," Mrs. Loskove said. "The people were very friendly and accepted me with open arms."

Mrs. Loskove quickly became a fixture in the community and was known for her good cheer and caring smile. Her students, now long into adulthood, still remember how special she made them feel at the age of 5.

"Mrs. Eva Loskove is the embodiment of nurturing education," said **Pace Cooper** (MHA '77, YOS '81). "She always had a smile on her face. She brought

the energy of a proud parent, wanting to provide her students with the warmth she wished her own children would receive from their teachers. She was extremely devoted to making kindergarten a special experience. The combined one-two punch of having Morah Eva Loskove for kindergarten and her dear friend, Morah Miriam Greenblatt, *z'l*, for first grade was a sure-fire entrée of excellence to the MHA experience."

"I fondly remember Mrs. Loskove," said **Asher Wolmark** (YOS '85). "Every morning, as we came into our classroom one by one, we were greeted with her warm and bright smile that made me (and, I imagine, everyone) feel like we were in for another great day of kindergarten. Mrs. Loskove never disappointed! She was kind, caring, thoughtful and always made each one of us feel uniquely special."

The foundational lessons in Judaic and general studies that Mrs. Loskove taught to hundreds of children throughout her career helped them thrive years down the road.

"Mrs. Loskove was one of my most favorite teachers," said **David Katz** (MHA '88). "Being married to the current MHA kindergarten teacher [Morah Michelle Katz], I can now truly appreciate the patience and love Mrs. Loskove had for us. As the famous book title suggests, we truly did learn everything we needed to know in her kindergarten class."

"Kindergarten was quite a long time ago for me, but I have clear memories of Mrs. Eva Loskove," said **Yedida Lubin** (MHA '91, FYOS '95). "Our weekly Shabbat parties in school instilled in me a love of Shabbat. She always told the story of the angels who would arrive as we sang *Shalom Aleichem* and bless all the houses that were honoring Shabbat. Mrs. Loskove was a top-notch educator, and I am grateful to her for giving me such a strong basis for my Judaism and love of Israel."

"I loved going to kindergarten and still have such vivid and wonderful memories from that year," said **Miriam (Amy Goldstein) Kahane** (MHA '89, YOS '93). "Mrs. Loskove was so caring. Every day, she set up our little mats on the floor for rest time. She took us out to play for recess and always wanted us to have a good time. I will never forget how Mrs. Loskove taught us the alphabet using letter books! I can still picture the letter books and how she helped us with such kindness and calm. She made learning so fun and enjoyable. I feel blessed to have been the recipient of her love and teaching."

Beyond the four walls of her classroom, Mrs. Loskove created enriching opportunities for her students to perform on the stage in the MHA gym


and to share their enthusiasm and love of learning with the community.

"Mrs. Loskove put on wonderful productions," Lubin recalled. "The year I was in kindergarten (1983) was when Israel was honored by Memphis in May. Mrs. Loskove dressed the whole class like a scene out of Mea Shearim [an ultra-Orthodox neighborhood in Jerusalem]. It was very fun to wear a *tichel* [headscarf]! The best production of all was, of course, our kindergarten graduation at the end of the year."

"The highlight of my kindergarten year was preparing for graduation," Kahane said. "Mrs. Loskove made us feel like stars! She was truly a phenomenal teacher."

In addition to being a dedicated faculty member, Mrs. Loskove was also the proud parent of three MHA students — **Rachelle (Loskove) Bernstein** (MHA '73), **Michael Loskove** (MHA '78, YOS '82) and **Debra (Loskove) Silverstein** (MHA '79, YOS '83) — and a devoted volunteer for the Parent-Teacher Association. (Her husband Marvin also served as president of the school's board of trustees.) During her tenure as president of the PTA in 1971, Mrs. Loskove wrote in the annual scholarship journal:

> "It is of extreme importance that every child in our school be the seed and the strong roots of future generations of our city. Our children should have the highest priority, for they are the symbol of hope that keeps our community moving forward. ... With tenderness and love, and in the spirit of the Torah, we at the MHA have planted, nurtured and cared for our children, praying all the while that our harvest will be even richer and more blessed."

Mrs. Loskove retired from her teaching career in 1991. "I loved every minute of teaching kindergarten," she said. "I adored the kids and what I was able to do every day. Each year brought new

challenges, which I looked forward to. The MHA was a wonderful place to work."

In 2001, the Loskoves moved to Chicago — where their story began — to be closer to their children who were living there. They've since been enjoying retirement and spending valuable time with their family, which now includes grandchildren and greatgrandchildren.

She epitomizes the teaching from *Pirkei Avos*: '*Hevei mekabel es kol ha'adam b'sever panim yafos [greet everyone with a smile*].'"

Two years ago, the Loskoves renewed their MHA/ FYOS connection when their granddaughter Annie Silverstein married **Yosef Goldblatt** (FYOS '17), whose family lived in Memphis for seven years. "The Goldblatts have been keeping us up to date on what's happening at the school and in Memphis," Mrs. Loskove said.

"We were a close-knit unit. It's sad to reflect on our class, as four of our classmates passed away at a very young age. They were four upstanding men who added to the history of our great Yeshiva and have since passed on to their Creator. I grew up with two of them since birth, with another since our early years in the Academy and the fourth through our development years in the Yeshiva. I kept up with three of the four until the days of their passing. I often reflect on the great times we had growing up and still find it hard to believe that they are no longer with us.
