Dear MHA/FYOS alumni and friends,



Dear MHA/FYOS alumni,



Over a year ago, we braced ourselves for the potential impact of the COVID-19 global pandemic on the economy; our student, parent and donor body; our ability to deliver on our mission; and the collective health and safety of our nearest and dearest. It

was hard to imagine then just how much we would achieve during the course of the year. All of those accomplishments can be tied to the exceptional leadership within our school and the dedication of our teachers, who adapted to working in new and unusual ways.

I encourage you to read the MHA/FYOS School Year in Review, which provides a summary of last year's highlights. The High Holidays are truly the pinnacle of the Jewish calendar. Some people use this time for serious introspection and personal growth. Others worry about crafting an explanation to their boss to plead for the extra days off from work. Some people spend weeks on holiday menu planning and inviting guests. For others, the awe of this time is enough to stop them in their tracks altogether. Everyone responds to these special and holy days in their own way.

I have always anticipated Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur and Sukkot with excitement, but also with expectations of a very powerful and emotional experience. Though it's been more than 10 years since I've spent the High Holidays with my family in Memphis, the image in my mind is still quite clear: my father, Cantor Ricky Kampf, belting out the 13 middot (attributes) of Hashem at Baron Hirsch while

everyone's mouths are desert dry from fasting on Yom Kippur, and my mother, Mrs. Anat Kampf, sitting in the center of the women's section, singing along and somehow still standing while everyone's legs are weak. She then begins to weep. I can't help but wonder: How is there excess water in her body to cry?

The Talmud teaches that while the gates of prayer were locked when the *Beit HaMikdash* (holy temple) was destroyed, the gates of tears were never locked. Those who cry heartfelt tears before G-d can feel certain that their prayers are accepted.

I remember as a young child watching my mother shed tears in shul and asking why she was crying. I looked around the sanctuary sheepishly to see if others were crying, too, and may even have been slightly embarrassed. Of course, my mother wouldn't answer me during davening. In fact, I never quite got the answer directly. Years later, when I became a mother myself, I felt that my face was suddenly wet in the middle of davening on Yom Kippur night, and I understood the answer.

On the first day of Rosh Hashanah, the *haftarah* highlights how Chana poured her heart out to Hashem, begging for a child of her own. The high priest Eli presumed from Chana's level of emotion and despair that she was drunk, but she continued to beseech G-d and her prayer was ultimately answered; she became the mother of the prophet Shmuel and the eternal paradigm of how to connect to Hashem through prayer.

My mother (who is featured in the Spotlight article beginning on page 26 of this issue) truly has a gift

for teaching. A good teacher does not have to explain everything step by step but rather can model behavior. Her teaching is exclusive to neither the High Holidays nor to third grade or middle school. The way she conducts herself in *shul* and cares for others — without thinking or explaining — has been a lesson in selflessness

for all of Memphis Jewry and two generations of MHA/FYOS students. It's people like my mother and many other special *baalei chesed* (performers of loving kindness) who have made it the norm in our wonderful community to invite people to our homes, take others in, provide them with meals, and care for their families whenever needed. Newcomers to Memphis watch in wonder; then, they too sign up to prepare a *mitzvah* meal for someone else, and the cycle continues.

D'VAR TORAH

In Parshat Kedoshim, the Torah teaches, "Kedoshim tihiyu ... ish eemo ve'aviv tira'u." We are commanded to live with holiness and to revere our parents. What is the connection between these two mitzvot? We often think about the mitzvah of honoring our parents as showing appreciation to those who have given us life and showering them with love and care. However, here the Torah commands us to also look up to our parents as role models to guide us in how to live our lives.

Thank you, Mom, for not only your dedication to the MHA/FYOS and to teaching in the classroom, but also for taking your teachings outside of the classroom and into our lives. I feel so blessed and honored that my children will learn from you in our school and outside of its walls. Ella and Avery have a backstage pass — the inside scoop — because they get to see you as you are inside your home.

Behind closed doors, some may put their feet up, gossip about others, or act differently than the public face they put on for others. However, your

selflessness is that much more tangible to those who get to see up close and personal just how many phone calls, airport rides, home-cooked meals and sleepless nights you devote to caring for others.

I hope and pray that my children will one day find their cheeks wet during davening as they model your behavior.



Mrs. Anat Kampf

Infusing our school with positive energy for three decades



When newlyweds Anat and Ricky Kampf moved from New York City to Indianapolis in 1986 to help revitalize Orthodox Jewish life there, they were sure they'd be back within two years.

Thirty-five years later, they are still quite far from New York — firmly entrenched in the Memphis Jewish community — and they haven't looked back. Since 1988, Mrs. Anat Kampf has been a fixture at the MHA/FYOS, serving in various capacities in the elementary, middle and high schools and inspiring two generations of students along the way.

The Kampfs' connection to Memphis began when Rabbi Rafael Grossman, z'l, longtime spiritual leader of Baron Hirsch Congregation, came to Indianapolis

for a wedding. He was so impressed with the outreach work the Kampfs were doing in Indiana that he wooed them to come to Memphis for a weekend.

"When we first arrived in Indianapolis, I was shocked by the small size of the community there," Mrs. Kampf said. "Coming from Israel and then New York, I didn't realize that such small Orthodox communities existed. It was definitely an awakening for me.

"Rabbi Grossman promised us that Memphis would feel like Yerushalayim compared to Indianapolis. It wasn't quite Jerusalem, but we were very impressed by what we found here. We enjoyed a beautiful Shabbos in Memphis, and even though we expected to go back to New York after a couple of years in Indianapolis, we gave Memphis a try."

Shortly after Ricky Kampf began his job as executive director of Baron Hirsch in 1988 (he later transitioned to the role of cantor), Mrs. Kampf received a phone call from Rabbi Bruce Rachlin, then-dean at the MHA.

"A teacher in the girls' high school was going on maternity leave and he needed someone to fill in," Mrs. Kampf said. (The teacher was **Mrs. Chana** (Anet Yaffe) Silver [MHA '76, YOS '80], who was

pregnant with her daughter Bracha.) "I came in to teach a model lesson, and Rabbi Rachlin gave me great ideas and insights on how to improve my teaching style. I ended up subbing in the girls' school for the rest of that year and am grateful it was such a professional and enriching experience."

Rabbi Rachlin insisted that Mrs. Kampf stay on permanently. "He was looking for a second grade teacher to teach *Ivrit b'Ivrit* [Judaic studies in Hebrew language] and knew of my Israeli background," she said. "I told him my experience was in working with teens, not elementary school students, but he was adamant that a good teacher is a good teacher and he'd assign me a mentor to help me learn."

That mentor was Mrs. Miriam Greenblatt, z'l, who taught first grade Judaics at the MHA for decades and was beloved by all who knew her. "Morah Greenblatt spent countless hours with me," Mrs. Kampf said. "She was in my classroom every single day. She helped me prepare each night for the next school day and on Sundays for the week ahead. It was like taking a hands-on master class in education and among the most incredible years of my life. The time I spent with her was so unbelievably valuable."

Mrs. Kampf quickly became a star teacher in the elementary school, where she taught second (and, sometimes, third) grade Judaics for years.

"Morah Anat Kampf has always been and always will be a wonderful educator, role model and friend," said **Dylan Cooper** (MHA '09, FYOS '13). "She somehow finds a way to treat her students with the same love and attention that she has

for her own children. The MHA/FYOS — and the Memphis community more broadly — is very lucky to have Morah Anat and to be able to benefit from her wisdom, love for Torah and nurturing guidance."

In the early 2000s, Mrs. Kampf took on an administrative role in the Goldie Margolin School for Girls, spending her afternoons in the girls' high school after teaching second grade in the mornings. That position enabled her to return to her roots working with teenagers and to serve as a mentor and role model to the high school girls.

"Mrs. Kampf came into school every day inspired with a self-generated positive energy," said **Rebecca Zeitlin** (MHA '01, FYOS '05). "With a smile that filled her whole body, she always talked about being 'proactive.' She really worked hard to help us see the best in ourselves, no matter how hard we made it for her."

"She is one of the most amazing people in the Memphis Jewish community," said **Becca** (**Rosenberg**) **Near** (FYOS '09). "Mrs. Kampf is such a strong role model. Even when there were moments of tough love, it was all out of support and love. Mrs. Kampf always wants the best for everyone and for all her students to succeed. She is a phenomenal person!"

"Mrs. Kampf has a skill set that cannot be taught," said **Jerilyn (Pocrass) Oppenheimer** (MHA '02, FYOS '06). "She is not only a phenomenal educator and terrific leader but also the world's most genuine human. When she asks, 'How's it going?" she really wants to know and isn't just using it as a conversation starter."

Mrs. Kampf's educational philosophy is rooted in the "triangle of our Judaism," she said: *Torat Yisrael* (the Torah of Israel), *Am Yisrael* (the nation of Israel) and *Eretz Yisrael* (the land of Israel). "I've always wanted my students to love this ideology and to feel a connection so it has relevance to their lives," she said.

To that end, she worked to introduce a Zionism class in the girls' school, taught by Mrs. Bluma Zuckerbrot-Finkelstein. "One of my favorite programs was the mock press conference we held on the Israel-Palestinian conflict," Mrs. Kampf said. "Community members served as the 'journalists,' and our Zionism students had to answer their questions. It was a very empowering program that showcased our support for Israel, as well as the high level of our students and our faculty."

Mrs. Kampf was also instrumental in bringing the *Chidon HaTanach* (Bible Content) program to our school. Students from our middle school spend months gaining familiarity with Biblical texts in preparation for the national exam. Those who score highly on the test qualify to participate in the national *Chidon HaTanach*, held each year in New York City. **Asher Finkelstein** (MHA '11) was national *Chidon* champion in 2014 and traveled to Israel for the international competition.

"We've had a very high percentage of qualifiers from our school over the years," Mrs. Kampf said proudly. "We've made an annual shabbaton out of the trip to New York for *Chidon*. Our students are

well prepared for the test! It's another example of the great accomplishments our school is capable of that are on par with schools in much larger communities."

Seven years ago, she transitioned to be assistant principal in the middle school, enhancing the experience of our fifth through eighth graders in her capacity as a teacher and administrator.

Mrs. Kampf was the driving force behind our school initiating a trip to Israel for the junior high students, designed to bring their classroom study of Torah and Hebrew language to life in the Holy Land. With tremendous support from parents and the community at-large, she accompanied the seventh and eighth graders on the life-changing voyage in the spring of 2019.
