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MESSAGE TO ALUMNI

Joanne Kahane, alumni committee chair

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Dear MHA/FYOS alumni:



In a manner quite uncharacteristic of me, I have put off writing my message for much longer than usual. I am sure the reason has to do with the sadness we're all feeling due to the painful situation in Israel and some notable losses we've experienced

in our community.

Since our last issue, two special alumnae with deep, multigenerational ties to our school were taken from us far too young.

Chavi (Adler) Greenblatt (MHA '83), *z'l*, left us at the end of December. She was not only an alumna but also taught at our school. Her husband, Rabbi Akevy Greenblatt, served as Judaics principal of our elementary school. Their daughters, **Sarah** (**Greenblatt) Klein** and **Sima** (**Greenblatt) Levine** (both MHA '10), are alumnae as well. Chavi was fighting a serious illness for several years and never gave up hope. Those of us who followed her journey will always be inspired by her determination and faith.

One month later, at the end of January, we lost **Tova (Samuels) Marizan** (MHA '88, YOS '92), z'l, just six weeks before the wedding of her son, **Aharon Marizan** (FYOS '16). Her other son, **Efraim Marizan** (FYOS '19), also graduated from our school. Tova was the daughter of Rabbi Yochanan and **Carol (Smith) Samuels** (MHA '60), who taught at the MHA for years. The Samuelses lost another daughter, **Heather Samuels** (MHA '90, FYOS '94),

z'l, just a few years ago. Like Chavi Greenblatt, Tova bravely battled health issues during her lifetime.

Many times before, we've highlighted in these pages how friendships forged at the MHA/FYOS last a lifetime and sometimes even longer. In the face of these tragic losses, this again proved to be true.

When Chavi became seriously ill several years ago, dozens of alumni and friends joined a WhatsApp group to coordinate the recitation of *Tehillim* (Psalms) in the merit of her recovery. That group functioned for years. I was always amazed at how many familiar MHA/FYOS names popped up on the chat daily. Though her family left Memphis years ago, Chavi remained in so many of our hearts.

While I was helping coordinate shiva meals for the Samuels family, my heart was warmed once again when we heard from a classmate of Tova's that the members of the class wanted to provide food for Shabbos. These schoolmates lived all over the U.S. and in Israel, yet they were united in their grief and desire to provide comfort in honor of their friend.

These acts of loving kindness are, I believe, what distinguish our MHA/FYOS family. Neither time nor distance weakens our connections.

Around this same time, we also lost two patriarchs of our community: Bernard Freiden and Izzy Katz, z'l. These men and their unwavering efforts are pillars on which our Jewish community and school were built. They were part of the original dream for thriving Jewish life in Memphis, and they devoted their lives to making that dream a reality. All of us owe them a debt of gratitude.

Bernard Freiden served as president of the board of trustees, and his beloved wife, Noreen, z'l, served as president of the parent-teacher association (PTA). Both of them worked tirelessly for the school for many years.

When Bernard was president in 1979, he wrote, "I find, suddenly, that after having been an Academy parent for 20 years, come September, I will no longer have a child in the MHA. This thought leaves me feeling more than a little sad and terribly empty. ... I personally thank

terribly empty. ... I personally thank G-d every day for the Academy's influence on myself and my family."

How gratifying it must have been for the Freidens to watch not only their five children attend and graduate from our school, but also 19 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren! At the time of Bernard's passing, the Freidens had three other great-grandchildren enrolled in the school and one more expected to start next year.

Israel Katz, known affectionately as Izzy, and his beloved wife, Pearl, z'I (also a past PTA president), were among the founders of the school. Much like the Freidens, the Katzes devoted their lives to serving our school and community. An accountant by trade, Izzy served as the school's treasurer for decades, never charging for his services. In 2022, he told me there were only a handful of religiously observant families in Memphis when he was growing up. "Everything I knew about Judaism, I learned from my father," Izzy said. "I helped establish the MHA because I wanted my children

to have a real Torah education. Once the Academy opened, *Yidddishkeit* mushroomed in this city."

I know that Izzy had great *nachas* (pride and joy) from watching not only his four children attend and graduate from the MHA/FYOS, but also 11 grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren. At the time of his passing, he had one more great-grandson and one great-great-grandson (our first fourth-generation student!) enrolled in our school.

I have a purpose in dedicating so much space to tracing the generations of these two families. Bernard, Izzy and their wives stand as remarkable examples of lifelong commitment to our school and success in instilling that commitment in their descendants. What extraordinary legacies they leave behind, and what exceptional role models for us to emulate.

We send our deepest condolences to Jeffrey Freiden (YOS '72), Denis Freiden (MHA '70, YOS '74), Hugh (Freiden) Gordon (MHA '72, YOS '76), Bradley Freiden (MHA '75, YOS '79) and Melissa (Freiden) Friedman (MHA '79, YOS '83), as well as to Allan Katz (MHA '65, YOS '69), Karen (Katz) Rubenstein (MHA '69, YOS '72), Ronnie Katz (MHA '70, YOS '74) and Marc Katz (MHA '75, YOS '79) on the loss of their beloved fathers. May they be comforted among the mourners of Zion and Jerusalem.

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The passing of these two gentlemen marks the end of a vital chapter in the history of our school and community, as we've now lost nearly all members of the amazing generation of pioneers to whom we owe our school's existence. For years, we've looked to their wisdom, creativity and tenacity, which those of us who were not there can barely comprehend. They were eager and unafraid to step into the rushing waters of the history of our city and our people, and with their efforts, they changed its course forever. We are tremendously grateful and will treasure the memories of these great men and women.

As we process the communal losses we've experienced in the past few months and continue to pray for the welfare of our brothers and sisters in Israel, we can take some comfort that spring is upon us again. The flowers and trees are blooming

anew, and we have another opportunity to convey to the next generation during this *Chag HaAviv* (the spring holiday of Passover) the beautiful traditions of our people. The great-grandchildren of our school's founders, along with their classmates, are receiving an excellent general and Torah studies education at the MHA/FYOS, thanks to roots planted by a holy generation of pioneers eight decades ago. May those trees continue to bear fruit for many years to come.

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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear MHA/FYOS alumni and friends:



On the upcoming holiday of Pesach, we will commemorate the exodus from Egypt, when the Children of Israel were transformed from a group of slaves to עָׁם יִשְׂרָאֵל, the unified nation of Hashem. The Torah tells us of the extraordinary events

(Shemos 6: 6-8):

לַכֵּן אֱמָׂר לִבְנֵי־יִשְׂרָאֵל ֹאֲנֵי הֹ **וְהוֹצֵאתִי** אֶתְכֶּם מִתַּּחַת ׁ סִבְּלָת מִצְרִיִם **וְהִצֵּלְתִּי** אֶתְכֶם מֵעֲבֹדְתָם **וְגָאַלְתִּי** אֶתְכֶם בִּזְרָוֹעַ נְטוּיָׁה וּבִשְׁפָטֵים גִּדֹלֵים:

Say, therefore, to the Children of Israel: 'I am Hashem. I will free you from the labors of the Egyptians and deliver you from their bondage. I will redeem you with an outstretched arm and through extraordinary wonders.'

'And I will take you to be My nation, and I will be your G-d. And you shall know that I, Hashem, am your G-d who freed you from the labors of the Egyptians.'

'And I will bring you into the land which I swore to give to Avraham, Yitzchak and Yaakov, and I will give it to you for a possession. I am Hashem.'

As we recall at the Pesach seder each year, Hashem took us out of Egypt – וָהוֹצֶאתֶי; He saved us from

slavery – יְהִצְּלְתִּי; He redeemed us using great might and wonders – יְגָאַלְתִּי; and He took us to be His nation – וְלַקְחָתִּי אֵתְבֵם לִי ֹלְעָׁם.

Upon unifying us as His nation, Hashem then brought us to the land of Israel to inherit it – וְהֵבֵאתָי. When we consider this transformative event in our history, which galvanized our identity as a nation, it is interesting to note the multifaceted approach. It was not a singular moment but a deliberate process that is defined by the sum of its parts. Similarly, the resulting people, עָם יִשְׂרָאֵל, is forged into a unified nation that is anything but uniform — rather, it is enriched by the individual identities of each of its members, households and tribes.

On the night of the exodus, Hashem commanded each household to take a sheep, bring it as a *korban* (sacrifice), and eat it only within their home. In fact, they were not allowed to take even a part of this *korban Pesach* outside of the house or share beyond their individual group. As the Torah says (Shemos 12:46):

It shall be eaten in one house. You shall not take any of the flesh outside the house, nor shall you break a bone of it.

While this may seem to promote separatism, the verses that follow directly unify the community by virtue of the fact that all of Israel performed this mitzvah and that we have but one common Torah. In defining our identity as a nation, Hashem demonstrates to us that we can be both a unified group and maintain our personal identity.

The whole community of Israel shall offer it. (Shemos 12:47)

Of the miraculous splitting of the sea that enabled our escape from Egypt's pursuit, the Midrash says that the sea split into 12 paths to allow each tribe to cross in their respective groups. According to this teaching, we did not abandon our individual identities at the most defining moments of our collective salvation. Yet, when we came out on the other side of the sea, we united in our belief in Hashem and sang His praise in unison. And when Israel saw the wondrous power which Hashem had wielded against the Egyptians, the nation feared Hashem; they had faith in Hashem and in His servant Moses. (Shemos 14:31)

As we approached Mount Sinai to receive the Torah, we find in the verse a curious mix of plural and singular tenses describing our encampment. Rashi famously explains that while it says they (in plural) camped in the desert, the verse states that they (in the singular) camped next to Mount Sinai because we were like one man with one heart, באיש אחד בלב, to receive the Torah.

Having journeyed from Rephidim, they entered the wilderness of Sinai and encamped in the wilderness. Israel encamped there in front of the mountain. (Shemos 19:2)

Upon receiving the Torah, the entire nation answered in unison, committing fully to follow the word of Hashem and the law that binds us together as one.

וַיּעֲנֹוּ **כָל־הָעֵם יַחְדָּ**וֹ וְיּאֹמְרֹוּ כָּל אֲשֶׁר־דְּבֶּר ה נַעֲשֶׂה וַיְּשֶׁב משֵׁה אֵת־דְּבַרֵי הָעָם אֵל־ה

All those assembled answered as one, saying, 'All that Hashem has spoken we will do!' And Moses brought back the people's words to Hashem. (Shemos 19:8)

While we accepted the Torah as one, we did not meld into one uniform group. As our newly formed nation traveled in the desert, we once again exerted our individualism. We camped in formation around the *Mishkan* (Tabernacle), with each tribe in their own camp. Not only did we maintain our divisions; we flew our flags proudly to represent each tribe's unique identity.

ָוְחָנָוּ בְּנֵי יִשְׂרָאֵל **אִישׁ עַל־מַחֲנֶהוּ וְאִישׁ עַל־דִּגְלָוֹ לְצִבְאֹתֵם**:

The Israelites shall encamp troop by troop, each man with his division and each under his flag. (Bamidbar 1:52)

The Hebrew word for nation, עָם, inherently encompasses this dichotomy. While the word שָם most often denotes nationhood, it also at times

refers to kinship or familial ties. Sharing a root with the word עָם, and using the very same letters, is the word עִם, meaning "with." Nationhood is defined as the joining together of disparate parts to create one whole. Yet in the creation of our nation, we do not become one; we join with. We are stronger as a nation when we recognize that we are enriched by our individual identities. While we are united by the Torah as one nation, we are unified but not uniform.

As we entered the land of Israel, וְהַבְּאתִיּי, in
Hashem's fulfillment of his promise to our
forefathers, we once again inherited and inhabited
the land in a tribal distribution. While we each lived
with our families in the land of our respective shevet
(tribe), the entire nation lived under חַּבָּה אַמַּת, one
Torah. We are indeed a nation of individuals united
in our collective faith.

challenge us at times to find our commonality. The Margolin Hebrew Academy/Feinstone Yeshiva of the South is the cornerstone of our Jewish community, bringing us all together in Torah learning and living. May we merit to always celebrate the individual qualities that enrich our community and our nation, while pursuing peace and unity for ourselves and the Jewish people as a whole.

The unaccompanied blessing of Sefiras HaOmer

The bracha (blessing) of Shehecheyanu is traditionally recited at the commencement of holidays and significant moments, serving as an expression of gratitude for reaching these special occasions. Its application during Sefiras HaOmer (counting the 49 days between Pesach and Shavuos) sparks a fascinating debate. My aim here is to deepen our appreciation for both the Shehecheyanu blessing and the practice of Sefiras HaOmer, which represents a staggering one-seventh of the Jewish calendar year.

Tosafos (Sukkah 46a) queries why Shehecheyanu is recited for certain commandments but not for others. For instance, it is said when building a sukkah and taking the lulav, but not when making tzitzis or tefillin. The deciding factor seems to be the presence of simcha (joy) or a significant deviation from routine.

Rambam (*Hilchos Berachos* 11:9) suggests that *Shehecheyanu* is said for time-bound commandments, like blowing the *shofar* or dwelling in a *sukkah*, and for *mitzvos* not regularly performed, such as *pidyon ha'ben* (redemption of the firstborn). The distinction lies between daily rituals and those that occur sporadically or annually.

Given these criteria, one might expect Shehecheyanu to be recited on the second night of Pesach, marking the start of Sefiras HaOmer. According to Tosafos, the joy of the holiday should extend to Sefiras HaOmer, as they are all mentioned in Parashas HaMoados in Vayikra 23. Following Rambam, since Sefiras HaOmer is a seasonal mitzvah (as noted by *Sefer HaChinuch*, *mitzvah* 306), it would seemingly qualify.

Yet, the prevailing *halacha* (law) does not include reciting *Shehecheyanu* for *Sefiras HaOmer*. There are three primary explanations among the *Rishonim*:

- 1. The act of fulfilling the *mitzvah* may lack an inherent component.
- 2. Sefiras HaOmer represents a period devoid of joy.
- 3. There is no suitable moment to recite *Shehecheyanu*.

The first group of commentators suggests that *Shehecheyanu* requires a *mitzvah* with a tangible action. *Ba'al Maor* and *Rokeach* note that *Shehecheyanu* is not said for *Sefiras HaOmer* because it is merely a remembrance and lacks a unique, daily action. *Sefer HaManhig* clarifies that merely counting "today is day X" does not constitute a distinguishable action akin to blowing the *shofar* or sitting in a *sukkah*.

The second group, echoing *Tosafos*, highlights the absence of joy necessary for *Shehecheyanu*. The *Ran* elaborates that *Sefiras HaOmer* lacks the physical joy or pleasure present in other holidays, reminiscent of the sorrow of losing the *Beis HaMikdash* (Holy Temple) and rendering *Shehecheyanu* inappropriate. Others suggest that since the Omer count originally related to the Temple offering, its current observance, without the Temple, does not warrant *Shehecheyanu*.

The third perspective is particularly thought-provoking. These commentators acknowledge the inherent reason for *Shehecheyanu* during *Sefiras HaOmer* but find no suitable occasion for its recitation. *Shibbolei HaLeket* notes that since *Sefiras HaOmer*'s timing is dependent on Pesach, it does not receive its own *Shehecheyanu*. *Sefer Avudraham* points to Shavuos, arguing that since *Sefiras HaOmer* counts down to the offering of the *bikkurim* (season's first fruits) on Shavuos, the *Shehecheyanu* recited on the bookend holidays suffices.

Radvaz offers a simple yet profound answer: How can one say Shehecheyanu for a count that never reaches a complete 50 days? This suggests that Sefiras HaOmer is a period of anticipation and introspection leading up to Shavuos, rather than a direct celebration. Some moments are overtly joyous and call for immediate gratitude, while others, like the Omer, are about reflective preparation, guiding us toward a deeper, more mature appreciation of the moments to come.

I encourage my fellow MHA/FYOS alumni to embrace the *Radvaz*'s approach to *Sefiras HaOmer* — and life in general. Not every moment calls for a *Shehecheyanu* or an immediate celebration. The Torah includes *Sefiras HaOmer* in its list of holidays as a non-holiday, emphasizing it as a period of anticipation and introspection.

May each of us appreciate our non-accomplishments and non-milestones. May we find value in the quieter transitions of life, cherishing the moments that might otherwise be overlooked. In doing so, may we remember to count every day, for that is the true blessing of the Omer.

IN LOVING MEMORY OF

Rabbi Daniel Rosenthal, z'l



In January 2024, the MHA/FYOS family mourned the passing of Rabbi Daniel Rosenthal, z'l, who served as dean of our school from 1997 to 2000. Those who knew Rabbi Rosenthal remember him as a sweet man with a warm smile who truly loved all of his students.

A few years before coming to Memphis, Rabbi Rosenthal started a Jewish school in Long Island. Once that school was up and running, he and his wife, Fruma, decided to take a sabbatical in Israel. Part of the agreement for this sabbatical, which was funded by a Bar Ilan University and Jewish Agency program for senior educators, was that he return to the U.S. afterwards to teach and foster Zionism among American students.

At that time, the MHA/FYOS was looking for a dean, so it was a perfect match. Additionally, the GMSG was in need of an administrator, so Mrs. Rosenthal — a nurse by training — served in that role on an interim basis.

Rabbi Rosenthal was known for his unique way of fostering loyalty among the school's faculty. He never dictated policy, instead encouraging teachers to work as a team.

"He always knew 'where the kids were at,'" Mrs. Rosenthal said of her husband. In other words, he knew what was needed to support each student's individual needs.

The crowning achievement of Rabbi Rosenthal's tenure at our school was establishing the Gan Ivrit program with Mrs. Talya Tsuna. Understanding there is a critical period for language learning in early childhood, he felt strongly that the youngest MHA students should become fluent in Hebrew. The dynamic duo of Rabbi Rosenthal and Morah Talya shaped the Gan Ivrit program — which lasted until 2002 — into a huge success and something for which he will long be remembered by participating students and their parents.

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After his first full year in Memphis, Rabbi Rosenthal wrote, "I am taken by the dedication and intensity of purpose of the members of the school's board and of our dear parents and supporters to assure that the education we deliver is the finest Jewish and general studies education possible."

The Rosenthals left Memphis in 2000 and went back to New York, where he spearheaded the new middle school at the Torah Academy of Suffolk County. In 2002, once that program was on solid footing, Rabbi and Mrs. Rosenthal made *aliyah* to Israel.

There, he taught at a high school for one year. Rabbi Rosenthal then decided to engage in full-time Torah study, learning for three years at Yeshivat Har Etzion (also known as "Gush") alongside post-high school students.

From 2006 until his passing earlier this year, he occupied himself with three or four *chavrusas* (Torah study partners) a day and traveling back and forth to America to see his children and grandchildren.

The Rosenthals were blessed with four children, 11 grandchildren and one great-granddaughter, born in Israel in August 2023. Rabbi Rosenthal was there for her arrival and had the opportunity to hold her frequently in the final months of his life.

In 2000 — Rabbi Rosenthal's last year in Memphis — he found himself in the position of presiding over our school's 50th anniversary celebrations. At that time, he wrote, "It is my blessing and prayer that the image of the devotion, faith and sheer doggedness of the Academy pioneers be constantly before the eyes of our present and future leadership. May our leaders, as well as our parents and supporters, be as successful in supporting and transmitting our Torah heritage to the present and future generations as those pioneers have so remarkably succeeded in doing to former generations of young Jewish boys and girls."

We extend our deepest condolences to Mrs.
Fruma Rosenthal and to their children: Rabbi Pinny
Rosenthal, Chana Baron, Sarah Rosenthal and Tehilla
Miller. May they be comforted among the mourners
of Zion and Jerusalem, and may Rabbi Rosenthal's

Role model to students and the community



In his 1986 book "All I Really Need to Know I Learned in Kindergarten," author Robert Fulghum posited that the world would be a better place if people simply followed the rules conveyed to them in kindergarten: things like sharing, playing fair and being willing to apologize. Few individuals are as well suited to impart such important life lessons as Morah Michelle Katz, who has taught at the MHA for 28 years, including 23 years in kindergarten.

Pennsylvania to Memphis, via New York

Katz grew up in Scranton, where her family was very involved in their local synagogue, day school and Jewish federation. Throughout her schooling, she struggled with paying attention in class. Katz channeled her frustration into a passion for pursuing a career in education, in the hopes of making school more fun, engaging and inclusive for others.

She left home for her final two years of high school to attend Torah Academy for Girls in Far Rockaway, New York. While studying there, she regularly babysat for the children of **Dawn (Posner) Goldstein** (MHA '81, YOS '85).

"Perhaps I was Michelle's first Memphis connection," Goldstein said. "She was one of our favorite babysitters!"

Following high school, Katz stayed in the New York area, earning a degree in early childhood education from Yeshiva University's Stern College for Women. Mutual friends set her up on a blind date with **David Katz** (MHA '88), who at the time was studying in yeshiva in Monsey, New York. They got married in June 1996.

"David had his heart set on living in Memphis," she said. "He wanted to come back and help build the community, following in the footsteps of his parents [Esther and **Allan Katz** (MHA '65, YOS '69)] and grandparents [Pearl and Izzy Katz, z']."

Embarking on an MHA career

The couple quickly settled in Memphis, and she began working at the MHA in August 1996. Though her background was in early childhood education, Katz's first assignment was teaching fifth and sixth grade girls.

"Mrs. Michelle Katz was my teacher the first year she moved to Memphis," said **Jessica (Baum) Sukhodolsky** (MHA '99 and the school's director of engagement). "One memory of her class that stands out is doing group projects on *Pirkei Avot* [Chapters of our Fathers]. **Shirli (Freiden) Gotlib** (MHA '99, FYOS '03) and I were assigned the principle of 'Make a fence around the Torah.' We wrote and performed a song about it to the tune of an Elvis

song! We had a great year, and I feel very lucky to now have her as my MHA colleague."

For the next few years, Katz bounced between a variety of assignments — including teaching junior high and high school girls, staffing the Judaics resource room, and supporting a short-lived program for two-and-a-half-year-olds — and excelled at each. After five years on the MHA faculty, she returned to her roots and found her true calling as Morah Michelle in kindergarten.

"I just love their insights and questions and those 'aha' moments when they start reading," she said of her kindergarten students. "I get so excited when a student figures out they can do something they initially thought they couldn't. I work hard at finding each child's strengths and helping them overcome challenges."

Joanne Kahane, alumni committee chair, recalls watching her first grandchild, **Shayna Kahane** (MHA '16, FYOS '20), reap the benefits of having Morah Michelle as her kindergarten teacher.

"One day, Shayna came home from school and told me Morah Michelle had gone around the classroom and asked each student to share something about themselves that was special," Kahane said. "As a professional educator myself, I was taken aback by the depth and significance of this seemingly simple activity. Morah Michelle doesn't only teach the ABCs, aleph-bet and numbers; she works to instill in each child a sense of self-worth and establishes the groundwork for the self-esteem they will need as they venture into the world. I watched four of my grandchildren pass through Morah Michelle's kindergarten class, and I am so thankful they had those experiences with her."

"Morah Michelle always made me and all the students feel so comfortable and cared for," said **Rakhel Finkelstein** (MHA '17, FYOS '21). "She has a special way of connecting with each child and making them feel valued and respected. She knows how to help every child and meet their needs. Morah Michelle is such a warm and kind teacher, person and role model. I'm so inspired by her care, connection and devotion to her students and how passionate she is about what she does."

"Morah Michelle Katz was my first teacher at the MHA," said **Benjamin Siegel** (MHA '18, FYOS '22). "She always brought her A-game to class and made

learning fun for everyone. 'Scientist of the week' is my favorite memory from kindergarten."

"I loved having Morah Michelle as my kindergarten teacher," said **Rena Wogan** (MHA '18, FYOS '22). "She really knows how to encourage each student. Her classroom is always fun and filled with energy. She's taught me so much about how to teach children and inspired me to go into education. Morah Michelle is an amazing role model who is passionate and determined to contribute to the community. She is the best!"

Camp Shemesh

As her family grew — **Avi**'s arrival was followed by **Shaya** (MHA '12, FYOS '16), **Daniel** (FYOS '17), Ezra and **Pesi** (MHA '19, FYOS '23) — Katz recognized that Memphis didn't have an Orthodox day camp where children could have fun and continue their Jewish growth during the summer. In 2002, she and then-faculty member Mrs. Mimi David opened Camp Shemesh at the MHA, so their children and others in the community could enjoy enriching summer experiences in a safe and

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nurturing environment. "We simply saw a need and worked to fill it," Katz said.

While most kids want nothing to do with teachers or school during their summer break, Morah Michelle and her creative programming for preschoolers and elementary students drew about 50 campers the first year. Enrollment has been as high as 80 campers in the years since.

"Many of my memories of Morah Michelle are now shaped by years of attending Camp Shemesh as a camper and, later, as a counselor," Finkelstein said. "Working alongside her at camp and as a substitute teacher in her classroom gave me the opportunity to once again experience the care and comfort I felt in kindergarten so many years ago."

Morah Michelle ran Camp Shemesh for 20 years, stepping down from her "summer job" in 2022. Under her direction and care, and thanks to her hard work and imagination, hundreds of children have enjoyed wonderful summers at the MHA. And the number continues to grow, as plans are underway for the 22nd season of Camp Shemesh in 2024.

A passion for volunteering

Inspired by her family's tireless efforts in Scranton, and by the dedication of the extended Katz family to

sustaining Jewish life in Memphis, Morah Michelle has devoted immeasurable time and energy to volunteering in the community. Upon her arrival in Memphis, she joined the MHA parent-teacher association (PTA). She has been heavily involved in fundraising events like the auction and candy sale for years and even served a two-year term as PTA president. Additionally, Katz serves on multiple shul committees at Young Israel of Memphis and on the board of Jewish Community Partners (JCP) at Memphis Jewish Federation.

"David and I came to Memphis to be a part of something," she said. "Both our families have a strong tradition of giving back to the community. I truly love volunteering when and where I can."

In June 2023, Katz was honored at the MHA scholarship banquet with the Eishet Chesed Award for her unwavering commitment to the school inside and out of the classroom and to the broader Memphis Jewish community. In presenting the award, MHA board member Emily Lennon said of Katz:

Michelle gives back to our community in ways both visible and behind the scenes. From her dedication to each kindergarten class, her leadership in early childhood, her

conceiving of and energetically running Camp Shemesh for 20 years, to serving on Young Israel shul committees and on the JCP board, to coordinating the dorm logistics, to organizing kosher co-op deliveries, to bringing meals to new parents. She is a role model to many of the women in our community. She has raised children and students with a variety of strengths and has helped them hone in on those strengths and work through their challenges.

Michelle moved to Memphis into a large and well-known family and made it her own, and she continues to help define our community — at the MHA and beyond. Just like with her students, she sees avenues of potential and puts in her own efforts and energies to help our school and community improve as a warm place of unity and with firm footing in Torah and Jewish values.

Reflections

Morah Michelle has been on the MHA faculty for nearly 30 years, but she shows no signs of slowing down. She is eager to teach her grandson Ahron, the MHA's first fourth-generation student, in kindergarten next year. She is also dedicated as ever to volunteering for organizations that are meaningful to her.

Looking back on her career achievements to date, she is grateful to the mentors and cheerleaders who encouraged her growth and development — including former MHA principal Mrs. Penina Wender, former pre-K teacher Morah **Barbara** (Katz) Kutner (MHA '64, YOS '68), former head of school Rabbi Benjy Owen, current early childhood director Ms. Katie Minner and the supportive
